

Overcoming Confusion About God's Goodness and life's Unfairness

Habakkuk 1:1-3, 13

- I. "God, I'm confused!"
 - A. "How long...must I call...or cry...but you do not save," Habakkuk 1:2.
 - B. "Your eyes are too pure to look on evil, you cannot tolerate wrong," Habakkuk 1:13.
 - C. "Why then do you tolerate the treacherous?" Habakkuk 1:13.
 - D. "Why are you silent while the wicked ...swallow up the righteous?" Habakkuk 1:13.
 - E. "Why do you make me look at injustice?" Habakkuk 1:3.
- II. "You're good but also unfair!"
- III. You can overcome confusion about God's goodness and life's unfairness.
 - A. God can't create unfairness.
 - 1. Habakkuk respected God as a good, supreme Creator.
 - 2. "Since everything exists by God's permission, He creates unfairness!"
 - 3. God placed creative abilities in humans, Genesis 2:15; 1:28.
 - a. When submitted to God, we create good.
 - b. When rebelling against God, we create unfairness, Genesis 3:6 & 8; 4:8.
 - 4. Permitting unfairness is not the same as creating unfairness.
 - 5. Description of God's creative acts, James 1:17.
 - 6. Humans blame God for unfairness, Numbers 14:3; Proverbs 19:3.
 - 7. Finally, Habakkuk realized that life's unfairness and God's goodness have nothing in common, Habakkuk 2:20.
 - B. Trust God's goodness when surrounded by life's unfairness.
 - 1. Habakkuk admitted life's unfairness. Habakkuk 3:17.
 - 2. But he also acknowledged that God uses unfairness for achieving good purposes, Habakkuk 3:19; Genesis 50:20; Philippians 1:12; Isaiah 38:17; Psalm 119:71& 75.
- IV. Trusting God's goodness removes worry about life's unfairness.

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
